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
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Thank you for your interest in the role of Team Vicar in the Woodfield Benefice in the deanery of North West Leicester. I am delighted that you are exploring the possibility of applying for this role and I want you to know that there are many of us here in the Diocese of Leicester who are praying for you as you seek to discern God's calling.

You can read more details of our Diocesan vision and strategy at www.leicester.anglican.org, but I want to highlight a couple of areas as you begin this exploration.

Firstly, as a key part of our diocesan strategy for growing the numbers of disciples, the depth of discipleship and growing our capacity to serve our communities, this role will incorporate a local response with a diocesan wide commitment. As part of this strategy we have discerned God's calling to establish 300 fresh expressions of church by 2030 (this equates to the number of existing 'inherited' model churches). This is an ambitious calling, and will only be achieved through prayer, intentional investment of time and resources and a focus on equipping all baptised Christians to be sent out in mission. You will need to show us that you share this vision and commitment, and want to be part of a movement of people in mission.

Secondly, as we move forward in this endeavour, we don't know how God will raise up the Pioneers and other ministers needed for the fresh expressions of church. We don't know how God will grow the culture of generous giving within the diocese to make this work sustainable for the long term. We don't know exactly how we will train, equip and resource people for this new work. There is much that we don't know and hence much that we will need to learn. You will need to show us that you are open to learning, committed to working humbly with other colleagues and above all, a person of deep faith and trust in God.

If you find yourself both excited and daunted by the prospect of what we are doing in the diocese, then it could be that God is calling you. Please read on, and talk with Archdeacon Claire Wood, 0116 261 5309.

I hope that I may have the opportunity of meeting you in the near future, but in the meantime be assured of my prayers.

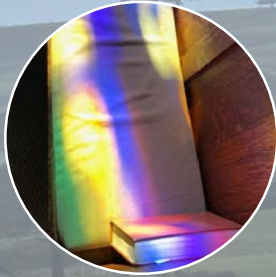
WHO WE ARE LOOKING FOR

ROLE

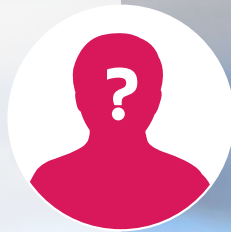
This is very much a whole Team post and encompasses:

ST MICHAEL AND ALL ANGELS, APPLEBY MAGNA



Doing together what is better done together, and delivering locally what is better delivered locally.

Appleby Magna is an attractive rural village which was traditionally a mining and farming community, but which today, with the addition of new housing, is chiefly a commuter village.

There are several historic buildings in the village, including the Moat House, The Alms Houses and the Sir John Moore School. The Team Vicar is a trustee of the Alms Houses, and the Sir John Moore Foundation.

There is a strong sense of welcome, encouragement and togetherness within our church family, with good team work and people providing help and support where needed. New people moving into the village have reduced our age profile and we are optimistic and keen to nurture our mixed age congregation.

There is a quiet depth of faith and though it is conservative in many ways, there is a strong commitment to marry the traditional and more modern approaches to worship.

The Church Hall is used for church and village activities. Church activities include a weekly Little Angels' Group (pre-school), Kids Kingdom on 2 Sundays a month and the Mother's Union, who provide support with Baptisms and Weddings.

Three years ago, we started a monthly Community Lunch in the hall. This is subsidised by the Church as part of our outreach. It has proved extremely successful and draws in around 30 people from both church and village. The School provide 6, year 5 helpers each month; this provides an excellent rapport between young and old. Most activities in the village centre around the church – Annual Fete, seasonal activities, coffee mornings etc. which are well supported. The school children distribute 100 harvest baskets around the village each year. There are thriving cubs and scouts, cricket and football clubs in the village.

The Church building dates from the 14th century with a major refit in the 1800s. It is a large church for a small village, so presents many challenges, but several major repair projects have recently been completed, with more which are substantial in the pipeline.

ST JOHN'S CHURCH, DONISTHORPE

St John's church has just celebrated its 180th birthday! Situated close to the centre of the village it covers a number of villages, the biggest of which are Moira, Donisthorpe and Oakthorpe. Centred in the heart of The National Forest, the parish of St John's is covered by two separate Parish Councils. The church community has many regular functions such as Coffee and Chat, Lunch Light, and Mothers Union. Christingle, Remembrance Sunday and other seasonal services fill the church to capacity as does the term ending celebrations for Donisthorpe School. With this activity in mind a complete refurbishment of the church is at the final planning stages to convert the church into a "Building For All" which is targeted at greater secular community involvement as well as energising a broader interest in Christ.

The communities within the wider St John's parish were based predominantly on coal mining and agriculture in the last century. With the demise of mining in the 1960/70s and the introduction of the National Forest Initiative the area is now growing with at least 200 homes either in the process of construction or the latter stages of planning consent. The community emphasis is changing and many residents now commute to the surrounding towns to work. The growth of tourism and leisure activities, walking in the many forested pathways and along the canal, to camping and caravan sites and Conkers, the off road cycle centre and Moira Furnace are just some of the many attractions drawing country lovers into the area. We have 5 public houses catering for all tastes from country pub to fine dining 3 within walking distance of St John's! There are many industrial units within the villages

There are active residents associations in some of the villages and Donisthorpe boasts a vibrant secular community with the Donisthorpe Action Group hosting 10 free social events a year for local residents; the parish as a whole has scouts, cubs and beavers, brownies, guides and rainbows; not to mention the burgeoning volunteer forest warden and walking groups.

In summary the Church Parish of St John's is a mixture of the old mining communities with their rich history and , over the past 15 years, a growing influx of commuters and self employed entrepreneurial types who are adding a modern vibrancy and young family growth. An excellent future lies ahead of us and this is a great place to live.

ST LAURENCE CHURCH, MEASHAM

Measham is expanding with many new housing developments. It was a coal mining village until the 1980's. The main industry now includes a brick works, plastic factory and a vegetable packing plant, with a well-known car auction. Many who live in the village are commuters due to good road networks. It is a village of high deprivation.

Beyond weekly Sunday worship and ad hoc teaching sessions, we have strong links with the local CE primary school. There is a Woodfield Team Youth group in the Church Hall for children 11+ years twice a month, Little Fishes for pre-schoolers runs twice a month and Ready Steady Stick sessions for 4-11 year olds are run during half term and main school holidays.

Alongside that there is weekly 'Activeage' for the over 60s, and the monthly Hobbies and Pastimes Group. We have regular coffee mornings and Fish and chip social events. As a Team we have a presence at the Measham Car Boot once a month in the summer.

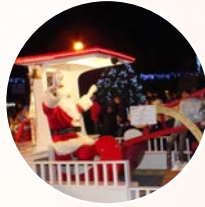
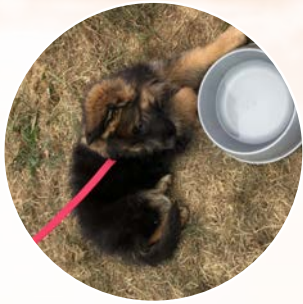
The Church building stands at the heart of the village on the High Street, and is the village icon. It is a warm, friendly church and much loved by the local people. It has recently

been renovated thanks to a Heritage Lottery Fund grant, and we are developing a suite of heritage activities as part of that project under the heading 'Bringing people together'. As a result there should be no major ongoing repair issues.

Village people see it as 'their' church. "Christmas @ Measham" is a well attended annual event with the church at its centre, when the village Christmas lights are switched on. The Christmas Eve Christingle service usually fills the Church to capacity and is seen as the start of Christmas for many. The adjoining church hall is much used for fitness groups, children's parties, uniformed organisations and a music group for those with dementia.

The High Street is lined with shops from supermarkets to hairdressers to cafes. The Medical Centre serves both Measham and the surrounding villages and has a good reputation. There is a Catholic primary school as well as a thriving youth club. The museum is the repository of much local history, whilst the sports and leisure centre is busy. Age Concern meets in an old chapel on the High Street providing a meeting place for the elderly on weekday mornings. A Foodbank operates out of the library.

HOLY TRINITY, NORMANTON LE HEATH

Normanton is a beautiful small rural community. The church has a distinctive location on the brow of a hill with its spire being visible for miles around. The housing is varied in type and age and provides homes for a range of young families, professional people and those in retirement. It has no village school.

The church is a focal meeting point. There is a very strong sense of community and people are enthusiastic to work together to overcome any challenges or issues the village, the church or its members might face.

There is strong support for a wide range of village events such as the annual Church Garden Fete, 'Horse' Racing, Quiz Night, Barbecue, Gin and Chutney making and even litter picking along the local lanes. These may be social and/or fundraising events and have

a reputation for including delicious catering. The church has over the years generated a real sense of community in this village and that is a real gift. In turn, the village set to and worked hard when the church needed some £60,000 worth of repairs, and helped raise funds.

Sunday club is held once a month at the back of the church in an area that has been converted to a parish room. Once a month we all share breakfast before our service and take time for "caring and sharing" to reflect on the successes and challenges of the month. A Pet Service has proved very popular supported by the local farming community.

Christmas is a very active time for the church with knitted Posada figures travelling the village, pop-up Nativity or

Christingle and often carols around the tree in the church yard. Harvest is also well-supported by this rural community with the service followed by a shared meal in the church attended and enjoyed by many parishioners.

The village is generous in its support of the church and others with annual donations to Christian Aid, Action for Children and the Children's Society.

HOLY TRINITY CHURCH, NORTON JUXTA TWYXCROSS

Holy Trinity Church is located within the small Leicestershire village of Norton Juxta Twycross and can be classed as a dormitory village. Norton has a village hall which can be used by the church for events. It has no village school.

Whilst attendance at Sunday services is relatively low, the church is supported within the village in different ways. There are monthly coffee mornings which fund-raise for the church and allow social outreach within the village community. The church also holds well supported church breakfasts and a summer barbeque. The last breakfast was for Mothering Sunday 2019 and a Harvest breakfast is planned for September or October. At Christmas, the church runs a carol singing and nativity service and hosts the Christmas Eve Midnight Communion every other year. This is a fantastic candlelit service. As expected, there is the occasional baptism, wedding and funeral. Weddings at the church are becoming more regular due to a wedding venue being located at a local farm. Other different services have occurred over the past years including a 'Plough service' for the National Ploughing Championships and a pet service.

Financially, Holy Trinity continues to pay its parish share however funding is very tight and in general the church runs at a small loss. The church council is very small and the demands of running the church are difficult for the group.

Holy Trinity has several major fabric issues. Plaster falls and other roofing issues need to be addressed along with other building projects. Such projects present serious challenges to be overcome.

Holy Trinity Church is a place of peace and prayer and is an important part of the village of Norton Juxta Twycross. It is hoped that this will be the case for many years to come.

HOLY ROOD CHURCH, PACKINGTON



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Packington is an attractive village with some new developments taking place. It is still small enough to have a sense of community with many community events held during the year. Church, school, pub, shop and village hall mix well together and are supportive of each other. For example, the church runs Christmas carols at the pub with the aid of the Salvation Army band. Villagers take part in the annual Open Gardens which raises money for the fabric of the church

As the people of Holy Rood Church, Packington, we have come from generations of faithful Christians. Holy Rood Church is a lovely peaceful place of worship with its first incumbent recorded as being in post in 1192. Sunday Club for 3-11 year olds meets monthly at the back of church. The church has long had a firm financial base and

gives generously to charities. Many from the village come alongside to help church activities.

The Packington and Normanton Ladies Group and the Men's Group have run successfully for very many years and meet monthly. They have been a good outreach to many beyond the church. As further linking with those beyond the church membership, we hold a monthly Coffeandchat@church, together with ad hoc tea and cake afternoons and soup and sandwich lunches. We hold a Christmas charity morning when we raise money for a local charity.

Currently we are having some refurbishment at the back of church to provide a new servery and disabled toilet, whilst removing some back pews to give

more circulation space at the back of church for children's activities and for serving refreshments.

We are going forward with vision and prayers for the future of the church and that villagers may come to know God as their Saviour.

ST BARTHOLOMEW'S CHURCH, SNARESTONE

Our much loved church has a small congregation but shares in the wonderful community spirit within the village. In 2013 St Bartholomew's opened a toilet and kitchen facility which now allows the church to be used as a village facility for entertainment and fund raising. We have flexible seating which means the space is easily changed.

Snarestone village boasts a Church of England school, two pubs, an Alpaca Farm and tearoom/restaurant a blacksmith and the Ashby canal. There is an active Parish Council. The Tote Committee which has been running for about 60 years organises the annual Christmas party for OAPs and children and the village mystery trip to the seaside(60 years), the Bonfire night event and the village Duck Race.

The church organises Harvest Supper Evenings and a variety of fund raising evenings during the year. We have a Carols by Candlelight Service and in recent years The Walking Nativity which has been very well received, in conjunction with The Snarestone Action Group which now organises other village social events. The village support the church events and villagers give monthly via gift aid towards the financial costs of the church.

The Allotment society is thriving as is the Garden Group. We have the Snarestone Panto Group which entertains each year (25th year) in February half term. The Panto Choir meets all year and performs at social events. The Globe pub supports the village and enjoys holidaymakers from the canal and the camping field to the rear of the pub.

Our challenge as a church is to encourage our villagers who support the church at events to come to church for worship.

ST PETER'S CHURCH, SWEPSTONE

The communities of Swepstone and Newton Burgoland were formerly an area of agriculture and coalmining and are now mainly dormitory villages. Newton has a good primary school and a pub and is altogether much more active. We have an active parish council which supports the Church in various ways.

The Church is much loved and very welcoming – many comment on how friendly it feels, even when empty. It is in good order structurally and well maintained. Having had the roof lead stolen in recent years it is now covered in a mix of stainless steel and zinc over the side aisles and nave. Plans have been accepted and passed to install a lavatory and kitchen area in the Church, connected to the mains drainage, and the pews at the back of the Church removed, but no application has yet been made for appropriate grants or no fundraising started.


We have plenty of willing helpers for cleaning, flower arranging and coffee making, all on regular rotas. We have a team of enthusiastic bell ringers who fund and maintain the bells with fees from weddings, etc.

We have our own organist who is also Church Warden. She, with her helpers, organise concerts and other suitable entertainments in Church two or three times a year. She also runs a popular community choir, the Woodfield Singers.

Swepstone's old Victorian school is now the Church Hall. This is let for such things as "Mums and Toddlers", a sewing group, Pilates classes, the WI and occasional private events/parties. The Craft Group meets weekly to make things to sell for the Church and to chat and drink tea! There are monthly coffee mornings and occasionally "all day breakfasts", which are very popular with all ages.

SCHOOLS



The Team Rector, curate and children's worker currently lead collective worship in all seven of the Team's schools. It is anticipated the Team Vicar will do the same. In addition the Open the Book team go into all 7 schools twice a term. This team draws its members from churches across the benefice. Our children's worker leads clubs at Appleby, Measham and Packington schools. We have good relations with all the schools whether they are Church or Community schools.

Sir John Moore School, Appleby Magna

The school is a church aided primary school of 143 pupils of whom 50% live in the village. The school is rated by OFSTED as 'outstanding'. There are 7 Foundation governors and the Team Vicar has been ex officio on the governing body. There is a good relationship between the school and the church. The school comes to church for end of term services and harvest. Church members run a 'pop up cafe' for parents after the services.

Set in the grounds of the Sir John Moore Foundation, the school occupies part of the grade 1 listed building, which has been a school since it was built in 1697, commissioned by Sir John Moore, and based on an original design by Sir Christopher Wren. It opened as a Free School for boys in 1697. The Foundation is responsible for the site and has offices for local businesses and uses the site as a wedding venue. The Team Vicar has been a trustee of the Foundation as well as school governor.

Donisthorpe Community Primary School

The school is a thriving and popular of 203 children. It is rated 'good' by Ofsted. The head teacher is executive head not just of Donisthorpe, but also of Measham and Hill Top in Ashby. The school comes to church at Harvest, Christmas and Easter.

Measham CE Academy

Measham is a standalone academy: CE controlled, with the same executive head as Donisthorpe. Rated by Ofsted as 'good' with a strong capacity for further improvement, there are 205 children at this school. There are 2 Foundation governors and the Team Rector serves ex officio. There are close church/school relations; the school visits for curriculum purposes as well as when the church has mounted 'Experience...' events. The school choir has supported church events and the church supports school events.

Newton Burgoland Community Primary School

Rated as outstanding on its most recent Ofsted inspection, this is a small school of 90 children. We have links church and school with families coming along to Swepstone church events such as the Star Switch on. Church members do go out to help in school from time to time.

Oakthorpe Community Primary School

Oakthorpe is a small school of 90 children. It is part of a multi-academy trust 'the Oval Learning Trust' which has Diocesan Board of Education Trustees. We have good school church links with the school visiting Donisthorpe church for curricular activities. The school doesn't have services there as there is a Methodist chapel in the village

Packington CE primary school

Rated a 'good' school in its recent Ofsted inspection, it has 107 children and is controlled. It has 3 active foundation governors and there are close links church/school. There are close church/school relations; the school visits for curriculum purposes as well as when the church has mounted 'Experience...' events. The children excel in their RE and indeed lead their own collective worship in church from time to time. The whole school comes into church at the end of term and for harvest and more recently Remembrance. We work together for the annual Christingle service.

Snarestone CE primary school

Another small school of 89 where many come from outside the village of Snarestone. It is an aided school. Its recent Ofsted inspection showed 'requires improvement' in many areas. The church are working to develop closer links with the School. This shows itself in that the School, as a whole, comes into church at least once every term

NORTH WEST LEICESTER DEANERY

The Benefice falls within the deanery of North-West Leicestershire. The deanery combines both urban and rural areas, stretching from Breedon in the north to Norton juxta Twycross in the south, and from eastern Coalville to Woodville just over the Derby county border.

The deanery has been focusing on the outworking of the Church of England headline “A Christian Presence in every community” as well as ‘Everyday Faith’. Deanery synod is well attended as topics on the agenda are seen as interesting; it functions well.

There is a friendly, happy and supportive chapter with a good regular committed attendance at both chapter meetings and socials. It functions well and the clergy of the deanery see North West Leicestershire as a “rewarding place to work”

The whole deanery recently worked at Trypraying with all churches having banners outside and distributing the Trypraying books. All the Woodfield team churches took part.

Parsonage House, 17 Rectory Lane, Appleby Magna DE12 7BQ

The Parsonage House, Rectory Lane, Appleby Magna is an attractive four bedroom detached house built on a plot of approximately one acre and situated 400 metres from St Michael and All Angels' parish church.

To the ground floor accommodation comprises: entrance porch, hall study, living room, dining room, kitchen, cloakroom & WC. To the first floor there are four bedrooms, one of which has an en suite, a family bathroom & WC. There is an attached single garage and a couple of outside stores.

A gas-fired boiler heats radiators to all principal rooms and the system is supplemented by an immersion heater for domestic hot water. All windows are double glazed in UPVC frames.

A large driveway affords ample hard standing car parking to the front elevation. The gardens are mostly laid to lawn with apple and pear trees to the rear garden. All side & rear boundaries to the adjoining fields are fenced in post & rail and wire fencing.
